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Rep. votes 'no' on bill to freeze Common Core
 Risk of returning to No Child Left Behind too high

The House Education Committee passed a bill today that would freeze the Common Core State Standards, but the measure was defeated in a 218-212 vote.

The bill, H.R. 1592, was introduced by Rep. Lou Gohmert (R-Texas). It would prevent any state from adopting or revising the Common Core standards without the approval of Congress.

Gohmert said the bill was necessary because the Common Core standards are "a federal takeover of state education."

The House vote was a narrow one, and the bill is unlikely to pass the Senate. The Senate Education Committee has not yet held a hearing on the bill.
