HOBY seminars are conducted around the world, and students between their sophomore and junior years are chosen to attend as ambassadors. In the United States, seminars are hosted in each individual state. Liberal High School sends two students to the Kansas seminar each year.

This year, HOBY Kansas was conducted from Thursday, May 30 through Sunday at Kansas State University, and LHS students Vanessa Diazdeleon and Richard Calderon had the honor of being chosen as ambassadors for this fun yet educational convention.
