Election of county residents to serve on the Seward County Extension Council will be on Tuesday at the K-State Research and Extension's Seward County Office, 1081 Stadium Road, just north of the Activity Center.

Members of the Extension Council support and help the county agents in leadership and development. It is necessary to have a combination of skills in management, education, fiscal responsibility and professional skills and talents among the members of the council.

The 24-member Extension Council consists of six members each serving on one of the Extension's four program/service areas which include Youth Development, Community Development, Agriculture & Natural Resources, and Family & Consumer Sciences. There are 11 available positions with 12 candidates.

Seward County residents are encouraged to come by the Extension Office on Election Day between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. and cast their votes for their choice of the council candidates. Those needing 'advance' voting can come to the Extension Office today any time between 8 a.m. and noon or between 1 and 5 p.m. to cast their votes.

Candidates for the open positions and the program area they will serve on are:

Agriculture & Natural Resources Committee: Vote for 2

Teddi Winslow, Rural Kismet has served a two-year term and is running for a second term. She is an agriculture instructor at SCCC/ATS where she coaches the Soil and Crop Judging Team. She supports educational programs especially in the agricultural and horticulture area hoping to build awareness about careers in those fields.

Nancy Parson, rural Liberal is running for her first term on the council. A former 4-H member as a youth, she is a retired administrative manager in Human Relations. She currently serves on the board of the Mid-America Air Museum Foundation and the County Historical Society. She would like to help enhance educational activities by combining or sharing efforts among these entities.

Family and Consumer Sciences Committee: Vote for 4

Jane Eisenhower, Rural Liberal has served a two-year term and is running for a second term. She is a Nutrition Assistant with K-State Research and Extension and her position includes working with youth in the community in the schools where she is known as “Professor Popcorn!” as she teaches the students about healthy eating habits.

Christine Standard, Rural Liberal has served a two-year term and is running for a second term. She is as an active volunteer with the county 4-H horse program. She also raises game birds and is a firefighter for the county. She is employed part-time for the Kansas Fire Rescue and Training Institute.
