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In the top half of the second inning the A's were able to scrap a couple of runs together to take the lead off of Garrett Rogers, and Sylman Pando RBIs, 3-1.

The Cardinals were quick to answer in the bottom half and scored on an Eric Gomez RBI single and an Eduardo Rosales two RBI double, and took the lead, 4-3.

There the score would stay for three innings. Then the A's came up to bat with the championship on the line in the top half of the sixth, in a six-inning contest.

Edwin Pineda led the inning off with a double, then David Gomez popped out, but the Cardinals attempt to double up Pineda went awry, and he advanced to third base. The nine-hole hitter came up big in Garrett Rogers who was able to connect and drive in the game-tying RBI. Sylman Pando popped out next in the order and the Cardinals turned two off of it.

The A's tied the game up 4-4, and went into the bottom half looking for a hold and a trip to extra innings.

After two outs Diego Zavala got a base hit and stole second and third to be in prime-scoring position. Eduardo Rosales was next in the order and hit a grounder past the pitcher up the middle, but shortstop Sylman Pando fielded it on the run and threw a dart to first base and the game moved into extra innings.

Dylan Shellenburger popped out to lead off the seventh, then Angel Archuleta connected for a single. Lorenzo Pando then stepped in and ripped one for an RBI triple. The Cardinals then were able to turn two again and went into the bottom half down 5-4.

They were able to tie.

The Cardinals loaded the bases and Lorenzo Pando walked in a run.

With their nine-hole hitter up to bat the Cardinals went for the win on an attempt to steal home but it was denied as A's catcher Angel Archuleta made a quick catch, block, then tag, and once again the game needed another inning to decide a winner with the game tied after seven, 5-5.

The A's were unable to score a run in the top half of eighth but the defense held strong to keep the Cardinals from getting anything going, and the teams headed into the ninth inning tied 5-5.

With two outs Archuleta stepped in for the A's and took one for the team to get a runner on base for Lorenzo Pando. Pando once again found a way to score Archuleta who stole second after getting beaned.

Pando hit a single, then a throwing error scored Archuleta, and the A's took the lead. A couple of errors followed, which allowed Pando to cross home, and the A's went to the bottom half of the ninth up 7-5.

Servando Avila was able to connect in the bottom half for a two-out RBI double for the Cardinals to bring the A's lead to one, 7-6. Eric Gomez made contact and hit what seemed to be a routine pop fly, but lack of communication in the outfield led to a drop and the Cardinals were able to tie it up once again, 7-7, and force another inning.

David Gomez started off the 10th inning for the A's and worked the count for a walk. Garrett Rogers then hit into a double play and the A's had no runners on with two outs.

Lead-off man Sylman Pando was up to bat and was walked, he then stole second. Dylan Shellenburger then hit a roller to the usual human- vacuum Cardinal third basemen, but in a rare Cardinal miscue, the ball made its way to shallow left which allowed Pando to score and gave the A's an 8-7 lead.

The Cardinals started out with a walk, but then a pop-out behind the dish and a laser throw from catcher Lorenzo Pando to first base turned into two outs for the Cardinals. A grounder to

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sure-handed shortstop Sylman Pando ended the game, 8-7, and the once winless A's celebrated, dumped the water cooler on their coach, and walked away as league tournament champions after a 10-inning, nearly 3-hour, Cal Ripken classic.

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
