Comer hit what may be a routine fly-ball to center most nights, but the ball began to die quickly and the El Dorado center fielder scrambled to make a play. He dove and it appeared he might have made the catch, but the ball never made it in his glove when he hit the ground, and Tanner Rindels scored the winning run. The Bee Jays walked away with a 3-2 victory.

"I think I needed a hit," Comer said. "Not because it was a hit to win the game, but a hit to get the first hit of the summer for me.

You got to give this to the pitching staff, the staff pitched great tonight."

Not only did catcher Comer get the hit of the night, but he was also key on defense. He threw out three Bronco base runners trying to steal.

"Again that is from good pitching," Comer said. "Our starter pitched great tonight, almost eight innings and only gave up one run. But if a pitcher isn't quick to the plate you can't throw anyone out, and they did a great job tonight."

Those clutch hits with the bases loaded were critical in a turnaround weekend. The Bee Jays now are at 2-2 and will take on Junction City at 7 p.m. tonight at Brent Gould Field.
