KBI investigating incident involving Kansas sheriff
TOPEKA, Kan. — The Kansas Bureau of Investigation is investigating an incident involving a sheriff's deputy and a woman in Topeka. The incident occurred on September 10, 2013, at approximately 10:30 a.m. at the Topeka Sheriff's Office. The woman, who is 35 years old, was taken to the hospital with injuries to her head and neck. The sheriff's deputy, who is 32 years old, was charged with assault on a woman. The KBI is currently investigating the incident and has not yet released any further information.

Hutchinson regional hospital settles federal allegations of Medicare false claims
HUTCHINSON, Kan. — Hutchinson Regional Medical Center has settled federal allegations of Medicare false claims. The settlement, which was announced on September 17, 2013, covers the period from January 1, 2011, to December 31, 2012. The settlement amount is \$1.2 million. The allegations were made by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Inspector General. The settlement is the result of a long and complex legal process. Hutchinson Regional Medical Center has agreed to pay the settlement amount and to implement certain changes to its Medicare billing practices. The settlement is a significant step towards resolving the allegations and restoring the hospital's reputation.

Topeka expands anti-discrimination ordinance
TOPEKA, Kan. — The Topeka City Council has expanded its anti-discrimination ordinance.
