Senate Democrats rewrite rules, erasing 255 years of filibuster rights of the minority

WASHINGTON — Senate Democrats on Thursday passed a sweeping new set of rules that would strip the Senate of its filibuster, a move that would allow the majority to pass legislation with a simple majority vote. The move is seen as a major power grab by the Democrats, who are currently in the minority in the Senate. The new rules would also eliminate the filibuster for judicial and executive nominations, which has been a key tool for the minority to block the majority's agenda.
